PERMIT TO OPERATE A PRIVATE FOX AREA

In accordance with Rule 39-24.002, Florida Administrative Code, this is to authorize you to operate a private fox area for the hunting of fox and coyote in keeping with the following provisions:

1. A fenced area used for the hunting of foxes and coyotes shall be a minimum of 100 acres.
2. All foxes and coyotes shall be kept in a safe, sanitary, and humane manner, with available food and water, adequate escape cover, and protection from the elements at all times. Such conditions are subject to approval by personnel of the Commission. After official notice by the Commission, any required modifications of facilities shall be completed within 30 days.
3. Foxes may be imported for the purposes of stocking private fox areas, but may not be taken from the wilds of Florida. All foxes must:
 - a. Be transported and possessed in accordance with State laws and Rules 39-6.0022 and 39-6.0023, Florida Administrative Code;
 - b. Be imported from states with a 12-month rabies-free status for that species, and red foxes must originate from states other than North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Iowa, Minnesota, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Alaska, Nebraska or Wyoming; and
 - c. Be imported as authorized only under a separate permit specifying the state of origin and number of foxes in the shipment. Each shipment must be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate/certificate of veterinary inspection.

4. The importation of coyotes is prohibited. Coyotes may only be trapped or relocated to private fox areas under permit from the Executive Director. All coyotes must:
 - a. Be transported and possessed in accordance with State laws and Rules 39-6.0022 and 39-6.0023, Florida Administrative Code; and
 - b. Be held in facilities surrounded by a fence at least six feet high, constructed of not less than 11½ gauge chain link, or such other fencing approved by Commission personnel, which is of sufficient height and strength to retain coyotes.

5. Prior to release into private fox areas, all foxes and coyotes shall be vaccinated for common canine diseases and inoculated with an helminic to eliminate tapeworms. After release, all animals shall be given periodic worm treatments offered in free-choice foods.
6. There shall be a minimum of one fox "escape area" per 20 acres of private fox area. The nature and form of such escape areas shall be at the discretion of the operator except that the escape areas must offer effective refuge from dogs. If there are not an adequate number of naturally occurring escape areas, supplemental man-made areas must be continuously provided and maintained as a condition of the permit.

There shall be a minimum of one coyote "escape refuge" per 50 acres of private fox area. Such refuge shall be a fenced area, which offers effective refuge from dogs, not smaller than one-half acre and not larger than one acre. Escape refuges may not be immediately adjacent to each other; i.e., opportunities for entrance into refuges must be at least 400 feet apart. As an alternative to fenced escape refuges, natural or artificial escape areas suitable for coyote (i.e., culvert, brush pile, etc.) must be provided in the private fox area. These escape areas must be scattered within the enclosure at a minimum of one per 20 acres. These coyote escape areas are to be in addition to the required fox escape areas per 20 acres, unless they can be used simultaneously (i.e., brushpiles).

All escape areas and escape refuges must be available for use by foxes and coyotes anytime dogs are present in the enclosure.

7. The number of dogs allowed to simultaneously hunt a private fox area shall be determined based on an assessment of ground cover density.

A classification system of three categories is established for ground cover. During initial and subsequent annual inspections by Commission personnel, ground cover in a private fox area shall be ascribed to Class A if it has a heavy ground cover, Class B if it has a moderately heavy ground cover, and Class C if it has a light ground cover. The maximum permissible density of dogs shall be one per five acres for Class A, one per 10 acres for Class B, and one per 15 acres for Class C.

The maximum number of dogs allowable on this area is one dog per 100 acres.

8. Any fox or coyote injured shall be, (depending on the nature of the injury):

- a. Immediately treated and released;
- b. Immediately turned over to a licensed veterinarian for treatment, at the veterinarian's facility; or
- c. Euthanized.

Foxes and coyotes shall not be possessed in cages or small areas at any time except during vehicle transport to a veterinarian's facility or back to the private fox area.

9. Permittee shall maintain complete and accurate records on forms provided by the Commission showing the source and date of acquisition, date of release into the private fox area, and date of mortality, if known, for all foxes and coyotes. Information kept shall also include veterinary care/inoculation records. Also, these records shall be maintained at the private fox area and be available for inspection at any time.

Permittees shall submit, on a quarterly basis, copies of such records to the Tallahassee Office, Division of Law Enforcement. Such records shall be due no later than the last day of September, December, March, and June.

10. Private fox areas shall be designed, constructed and maintained so as to ensure that neither foxes, coyotes, nor dogs can escape or enter the area. Fencing must provide a ground apron or electric wire capable of preventing animals from digging out and an overhang or electric wire capable of preventing animals from climbing over the fence.
11. Facilities and records of any private fox area are subject to inspection by representatives of the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission at all times.
12. Failure to provide by all terms or conditions of this permit shall be grounds for revocation or denial of this permit under the provisions of Chapter 120, Florida Statutes.

This permit will expire February 28, 2001, unless otherwise authorized by the Executive Director.

PERMIT TO OPERATE A PRIVATE FOX AREA

In accordance with Rule 68A-24.002, Florida Administrative Code, this is to authorize you to operate a private fox area for the hunting of fox in keeping with the following provisions:

1. A fenced area used for the hunting of fox shall be a minimum of 100 acres.
2. All fox shall be kept in a safe, sanitary, and humane manner, with available food and water, adequate escape cover, and protection from the elements at all times. Such conditions are subject to approval by personnel of the Commission. After official notice by the Commission, any required modifications of facilities shall be completed within 30 days.
3. Foxes may be imported for the purposes of stocking private fox areas, but may not be taken from the wilds of Florida. All foxes must:
 - a. Be transported and possessed in accordance with State laws and Rules 68A-6.0022 and 68A-6.0023, Florida Administrative Code;
 - b. Be imported from states with a 12-month rabies-free status for that species, and red foxes must originate from states other than North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Iowa, Minnesota, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Alaska, Nebraska or Wyoming.
 - c. Be imported as authorized only under a separate permit specifying the state of origin and number of foxes in the shipment. Each shipment must be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate/ certificate of veterinary inspection.
4. The importation or use of coyotes is prohibited.

5. Prior to release into private fox areas, all fox shall be vaccinated for common canine diseases and inoculated with an helminic to eliminate tapeworms. After release, all animals shall be given periodic worm treatments offered in free-choice foods.
6. There shall be a minimum of one fox "escape area" per 20 acres of private fox area. The nature and form of such escape areas shall be at the discretion of the operator except that the escape areas must offer effective refuge from dogs. If there are not an adequate number of naturally occurring escape areas, supplemental man-made areas must be continuously provided and maintained as a condition of the permit.

Escape refuges may not be immediately adjacent to each other.

All escape areas and escape refuges must be available for use by fox anytime dogs are present in the enclosure.

7. The number of dogs allowed to simultaneously hunt a private fox area shall be determined based on an assessment of ground cover density.

A classification system of three categories is established for ground cover. During initial and subsequent annual inspections by Commission personnel, ground cover in a private fox area shall be ascribed to Class A if it has a heavy ground cover, Class B if it has a moderately heavy ground cover, and Class C if it has a light ground cover. The maximum permissible density of dogs shall be one per five acres for Class A, one per 10 acres for Class B, and one per 15 acres for Class C.

The maximum number of dogs allowable on this area is one dog per 10 acres.

8. Any fox injured shall be, (depending on the nature of the injury):
 - a. Immediately treated and released;
 - b. Immediately turned over to a licensed veterinarian for treatment, at the veterinarian's facility; or
 - c. Euthanized.

Fox shall not be possessed in cages or small areas at any time except during vehicle transport to a veterinarian's facility or back to the private fox area.

9. Permittee shall maintain complete and accurate records on forms provided by the Commission showing the source and date of acquisition, date of release into the private fox area, and date of mortality, if known, for all fox. Information kept shall also include veterinary care/inoculation records. Also, these records shall be maintained at the private fox area and be available for inspection at any time.


Permittees shall submit, on a quarterly basis, copies of such records to the Tallahassee Office, Division of Law Enforcement. Such records shall be due no later than the last day of September, December, March, and June.

10. Private fox areas shall be designed, constructed and maintained so as to ensure that neither fox, nor dogs can escape or enter the area. Fencing must provide a ground apron or electric wire capable of preventing animals from digging out and an overhang or electric wire capable of preventing animals from climbing over the fence.
11. Facilities and records of any private fox area are subject to inspection by representatives of the Florida Wildlife Conservation Commission at all times.
12. Failure to provide by all terms or conditions of this permit shall be grounds for revocation or denial of this permit under the provisions of Chapter 120, Florida Statutes.





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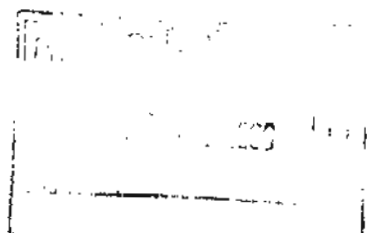

PERMIT TO OPERATE A PRIVATE FOX AREA

In accordance with Rule 68A-24.002, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), this is to authorize you to operate a private fox area for the hunting of fox and coyote at the facility location, **Shady Oaks Fox Pen, 4000 South Highway 99, Walnut Hill, FL 32568**, in keeping with the following provisions:

1. A fenced area used for the hunting of fox shall be a minimum of 100 acres.
2. All fox and coyote shall be kept in a safe, sanitary, and humane manner, with available food and water, adequate escape cover, and protection from the elements at all times. Such conditions are subject to approval by personnel of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC). After official notice by the FWC, any required modifications of facilities shall be completed within 30 days.
3. Foxes may be imported for the purposes of stocking private fox areas, but may not be taken from the wilds of Florida. All foxes must:
 - a. Be transported and possessed in accordance with State laws and Rules 68A-6.0022 and 68A-6.0023, F.A.C.;
 - b. Be imported from states with a 12-month rabies-free status for that species, and red foxes must originate from states other than North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Iowa, Minnesota, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Alaska, Nebraska or Wyoming.
 - c. Be imported as authorized only under a separate permit specifying the state of origin and number of foxes in the shipment. Each shipment must be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate/certificate of veterinary inspection.

6. There shall be a minimum of one fox "escape area" per 20 acres of private fox area. The nature and form of such escape areas shall be at the discretion of the operator except that the escape areas must offer effective refuge from dogs. If there is not an adequate number of naturally occurring escape areas, supplemental man-made areas must be continuously provided and maintained as a condition of the permit.

There shall be a minimum of one coyote "escape refuge" per 50 acres of private fox area. Such refuge shall be a fenced area, which offers effective refuge from dogs, not smaller than one-half acre and not larger than one acre. Escape refuges may not be immediately adjacent to each other; i.e., opportunities for entrance into refuges must be at least 400 feet apart. As an alternative to fenced escape refuges, natural or artificial escape areas suitable for coyote (i.e., culvert, brush pile, etc.) must be provided in the private fox area. These escape areas must be scattered within the enclosure at a minimum of one per 20 acres. These coyote escape areas are to be in addition to the required fox escape areas per 20 acres, unless they can be used simultaneously (i.e., brush piles).

All escape areas and escape refuges must be available for use by fox anytime dogs are present in the enclosure.

7. The number of dogs allowed to simultaneously hunt a private fox area shall be determined based on an assessment of ground cover density.

A classification system of three categories is established for ground cover. During initial and subsequent annual inspections by FWC personnel, ground cover in a private fox area shall be ascribed to Class A if it has a heavy ground cover, Class B if it has a moderately heavy ground cover, and Class C if it has a light ground cover. The maximum permissible density of dogs shall be one per five acres for Class A, one per 10 acres for Class B, and one per 15 acres for Class C.

This pen has been evaluated at a Class A density. The maximum number of dogs allowable on this area is one dog per 5 acres.

8. Any fox or coyote injured shall be, (depending on the nature of the injury):

 - b. Immediately turned over to a licensed veterinarian for treatment, at the veterinarian's facility; or
 - c. Euthanized.

Fox and coyotes shall not be possessed in cages or small areas at any time except during vehicle transport to a veterinarian's facility or back to the private fox area.

9. Permittee shall maintain complete and accurate records on forms provided by the Commission showing the source and date of acquisition, date of release into the private fox area, and date of mortality, if known, for all fox and coyotes. Information kept shall also include veterinary care/inoculation records. Also, these records shall be maintained at the private fox area and be available for inspection at any time.

Permittees shall submit, on a quarterly basis, copies of such records to the Tallahassee Office, Division of Law Enforcement. Such records shall be due no later than the last day of September, December, March, and June.



- (g) incidents of injury to wildlife, dogs, and human participants and spectators associated with wildlife penning and coursing operations;
- (h) incidents of escape of wildlife or dogs associated with wildlife penning and coursing operations;
- (i) diseases and parasites associated with wildlife that may be used as bait animals in wildlife penning and coursing operations, and any reported incidents of disease or parasite outbreak or transmission associated with wildlife actually used in wildlife penning and coursing operations;
- (j) vaccination and quarantine of animals, including both bait wildlife and dogs, involved in wildlife penning and coursing operations;
- (k) veterinary medical care or euthanasia required for animals, including both bait wildlife and dogs, involved in wildlife penning and coursing operations; and
- (l) any other records relating to the regulation of wildlife penning and coursing operations.

Pursuant to section 119.01 of the Act:

(1) It is the policy of this state that all state, county, and municipal records are open for personal inspection and copying by any person. Providing access to public records is a duty of each agency.

Further, section 119.07 requires that:

(1)(a) Every person who has custody of a public record shall permit the record to be inspected and copied by any person desiring to do so, at any reasonable time, under reasonable conditions, and under supervision by the custodian of the public records.

Here, the requested records are not specifically exempted from disclosure by state or federal law, and we believe these records do not meet any other requirements for exemption that may exist under Florida law.

If the release of any of the information requested is denied in whole or in part, please provide an explanation of what information is withheld and the reason for such withholding or denial, including reference to the specific statutory exemption(s) upon which you rely. Also, please provide all segregable portions of otherwise exempt material, and explain any redactions by reference to specific statutory provisions that allow the information to be exempted from disclosure.

The HSUS requests a fee waiver for the production of these records. Nothing in the Act prohibits an agency from waiving the fee for copies of records. In fact, federal agencies acting pursuant to the federal Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA"), upon which the Florida Public Records Act is presumably based, routinely grant fee waivers for requests that serve the public interest or when the requestor is considered part of the news media. As demonstrated from the following information, The HSUS fits both criteria.

Founded in 1954, The HSUS is the nation's largest animal protection organization whose mission is to promote the protection of all animals, including wildlife, and to advocate against all forms of animal cruelty, including egregious hunting practices such as wildlife penning. Thank you for returning my call. This is in follow up to your public records request pertaining to documents associated with wildlife penning and field coursing exhibition. Attached is a copy of the estimated costs for completing this public records request.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) regulates private fox areas for the hunting of fox and/or coyote. Here is some basic information about this activity. In order to operate a private fox area a permit is required in accordance with Rules 68A-24.002 and 68A-9.0022, Florida Administrative Code. These areas are inspected and approved prior to the issuance of a permit. The FWC worked closely with the HSUS and other interested parties in developing permit conditions to address fair chase and humane treatment standards.

Private fox areas shall be a minimum of 100 acres. All foxes and coyotes shall be kept in a safe, sanitary and humane manner, with available food and water, adequate escape cover and protection from the elements at all times. Prior to release into private fox areas, all foxes and coyotes shall be vaccinated for common canine diseases. After release, all animals shall be given periodic worm treatments offered in free-choice foods.

Additionally, there shall be a minimum of one fox "escape area" per 20 acres of private fox area; and minimum of one coyote "escape refuge" per 50 acres of private fox area. All escape areas and escape refuges must be dog-proof and available for use by fox or coyote any time dogs are present in the enclosure. If there are not an adequate number of naturally occurring escape areas or escape refuges, supplemental man-made areas must be continuously provided and maintained as a condition of the permit. Any fox or coyote injured during the chase shall be immediately treated and released, turned over to a licensed veterinarian for treatment, or humanely euthanized depending on the nature of the injury.

The number of dogs allowed to simultaneously hunt a private fox area is determined based on an assessment of the ground cover density. A Class A, B, or C density is assigned based on ground cover available in the private fox area. Class A density is ascribed to private fox areas with heavy ground cover. Class B density is ascribed to private fox areas with moderately heavy ground cover. Class C density is ascribed to private fox enclosures with light ground cover. The maximum permissible density of dogs shall be 1 per 5 acres for Class A, 1 per 10 acres for Class B, and 1 per 15 acres for Class C.

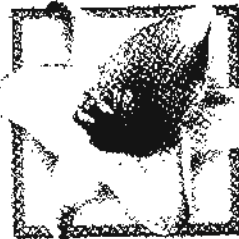

1. A fenced area used for the hunting of fox shall be a minimum of 100 acres.
2. All fox and coyote shall be kept in a safe, sanitary, and humane manner, with available food and water, adequate escape cover, and protection from the elements at all times. Such conditions are subject to approval by personnel of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC). After official notice by the FWC, any required modifications of facilities shall be completed within 30 days.
3. Foxes may be imported for the purposes of stocking private fox areas, but may not be taken from the wilds of Florida. All foxes must:
 - a. Be transported and possessed in accordance with State laws and Rules 68A-6.0022 and 68A-6.0023, F.A.C.;
 - b. Be imported from states with a 12-month rabies-free status for that species, and red foxes must originate from states other than North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Iowa, Minnesota, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Alaska, Nebraska or Wyoming.
 - c. Be imported as authorized only under a separate permit specifying the state of origin and number of foxes in the shipment. Each shipment must be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate/certificate of veterinary inspection.

4. The importation of coyotes is prohibited. Coyotes may only be trapped or relocated to private fox areas under permit from the Executive Director. All coyotes must:
 - a. Be transported and possessed in accordance with State laws and Rules 68A-6.0022 and 68A-6.0023, F.A.C.; and
 - b. Be held in facilities surrounded by a fence at least six feet high, constructed of not less than 11 1/2 gauge chain link, or such other fencing approved by FWC personnel, which is of sufficient height and strength to retain coyotes.
5. Prior to release into private fox areas, all fox and coyotes shall be vaccinated for common canine diseases and inoculated with an anthelmintic to eliminate tapeworms. After release, all animals shall be given periodic worm treatments offered in free-choice foods.
6. There shall be a minimum of one fox "escape area" per 20 acres of private fox area. The nature and form of such escape areas shall be at the discretion of the operator except that the escape areas must offer effective refuge from dogs. If there is not an adequate number of naturally occurring escape areas, supplemental man-made areas must be continuously provided and maintained as a condition of the permit.

There shall be a minimum of one coyote "escape refuge" per 50 acres of private fox area. Such refuge shall be a fenced area, which offers effective refuge from dogs, not smaller than one-half acre and not larger than one acre. Escape refuges may not be immediately adjacent to each other; i.e., opportunities for entrance into refuges must be at least 400 feet apart. As an alternative to fenced escape refuges, natural or artificial escape areas suitable for coyote (i.e., culvert, brush pile, etc.) must be provided in the private fox area. These escape areas must be scattered within the enclosure at a minimum of one per 20 acres. These coyote escape areas are to be in addition to the required fox escape areas per 20 acres, unless they can be used simultaneously (i.e., brush piles).

All escape areas and escape refuges must be available for use by fox anytime dogs are present in the enclosure.

7. The number of dogs allowed to simultaneously hunt a private fox area shall be determined based on an assessment of ground cover density.

A classification system of three categories is established for ground cover. During initial and subsequent annual inspections by FWC personnel, ground cover in a private fox area shall be ascribed to Class A if it has a heavy ground cover, Class B if it has a moderately heavy ground cover, and Class C if it has a light ground cover. The maximum permissible density of dogs shall be one per five acres for Class A, one per 10 acres for Class B, and one per 15 acres for Class C.

This pen has been evaluated at a Class A density. The maximum number of dogs allowable on this area is one dog per 5 acres.

8. Any fox or coyote injured shall be, (depending on the nature of the injury):
 - a. Immediately treated and released;
 - b. Immediately turned over to a licensed veterinarian for treatment, at the veterinarian's facility; or
 - c. Euthanized.

Fox and coyotes shall not be possessed in cages or small areas at any time except during vehicle transport to a veterinarian's facility or back to the private fox area.


9. Permittee shall maintain complete and accurate records on forms provided by the Commission showing the source and date of acquisition, date of release into the private fox area, and date of mortality, if known, for all fox and coyotes. Information kept shall also include veterinary care/inoculation records. Also, these records shall be maintained at the private fox area and be available for inspection at any time.

Permittees shall submit, on a quarterly basis, copies of such records to the Tallahassee Office, Division of Law Enforcement. Such records shall be due no later than the last day of September, December, March, and June.

10. Private fox areas shall be designed, constructed and maintained so as to ensure that neither fox, coyotes, nor dogs can escape or enter the area. Fencing must provide a ground apron or electric wire capable of preventing animals from digging out and an overhang or electric wire capable of preventing animals from climbing over the fence.
11. Facilities and records of any private fox area are subject to inspection by representatives of the FWC at all times.
12. Failure to provide by all terms or conditions of this permit shall be grounds for revocation or denial of this permit under the provisions of Chapter 120, Florida Statutes.

This permit, Number 2127-FX, will expire April 20, 2010, unless otherwise authorized by the Executive Director.

PERMIT TO OPERATE A PRIVATE FOX AREA

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1. A fenced area used for the hunting of fox shall be a minimum of 100 acres.
2. All fox and coyote shall be kept in a safe, sanitary, and humane manner, with available food and water, adequate escape cover, and protection from the elements at all times. Such conditions are subject to approval by personnel of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC). After official notice by the FWC, any required modifications of facilities shall be completed within 30 days.
3. Foxes may be imported for the purposes of stocking private fox areas, but may not be taken from the wilds of Florida. All foxes must:
 - a. Be transported and possessed in accordance with State laws and Rules 68A-6.0022 and 68A-6.0023, F.A.C.;
 - b. Be imported from states with a 12-month rabies-free status for that species, and red foxes must originate from states other than North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Iowa, Minnesota, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Alaska, Nebraska or Wyoming.
 - c. Be imported as authorized only under a separate permit specifying the state of origin and number of foxes in the shipment. Each shipment must be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate/certificate of veterinary inspection.

4. The importation of coyotes is prohibited. Coyotes may only be trapped or relocated to private fox areas under permit from the Executive Director. All coyotes must:
 - a. Be transported and possessed in accordance with State laws and Rules 68A-6.0022 and 68A-6.0023, F.A.C.; and
 - b. Be held in facilities surrounded by a fence at least six feet high, constructed of not less than 11 1/2 gauge chain link, or such other fencing approved by FWC personnel, which is of sufficient height and strength to retain coyotes.
5. Prior to release into private fox areas, all fox and coyotes shall be vaccinated for common canine diseases and inoculated with an anthelmintic to eliminate tapeworms. After release, all animals shall be given periodic worm treatments offered in free-choice foods.
6. There shall be a minimum of one fox "escape area" per 20 acres of private fox area. The nature and form of such escape areas shall be at the discretion of the operator except that the escape areas must offer effective refuge from dogs. If there is not an adequate number of naturally occurring escape areas, supplemental man-made areas must be continuously provided and maintained as a condition of the permit.

There shall be a minimum of one coyote "escape refuge" per 50 acres of private fox area. Such refuge shall be a fenced area, which offers effective refuge from dogs, not smaller than one-half acre and not larger than one acre. Escape refuges may not be immediately adjacent to each other; i.e., opportunities for entrance into refuges must be at least 400 feet apart. As an alternative to fenced escape refuges, natural or artificial escape areas suitable for coyote (i.e., culvert, brush pile, etc.) must be provided in the private fox area. These escape areas must be scattered within the enclosure at a minimum of one per 20 acres. These coyote escape areas are to be in addition to the required fox escape areas per 20 acres, unless they can be used simultaneously (i.e., brush piles).

All escape areas and escape refuges must be available for use by fox anytime dogs are present in the enclosure.

7. The number of dogs allowed to simultaneously hunt a private fox area shall be determined based on an assessment of ground cover density.

A classification system of three categories is established for ground cover. During initial and subsequent annual inspections by FWC personnel, ground cover in a private fox area shall be ascribed to Class A if it has a heavy ground cover, Class B if it has a moderately heavy ground cover, and Class C if it has a light ground cover. The maximum permissible density of dogs shall be one per five acres for Class A, one per 10 acres for Class B, and one per 15 acres for Class C.

This pen has been evaluated at a Class A density. The maximum number of dogs allowable on this area is one dog per 5 acres.

8. Any fox or coyote injured shall be, (depending on the nature of the injury):
 - a. Immediately treated and released;
 - b. Immediately turned over to a licensed veterinarian for treatment, at the veterinarian's facility; or
 - c. Euthanized.

Fox and coyotes shall not be possessed in cages or small areas at any time except during vehicle transport to a veterinarian's facility or back to the private fox area.

9. Permittee shall maintain complete and accurate records on forms provided by the Commission showing the source and date of acquisition, date of release into the private fox area, and date of mortality, if known, for all fox and coyotes. Information kept shall also include veterinary care/inoculation records. Also, these records shall be maintained at the private fox area and be available for inspection at any time.

Permittees shall submit, on a quarterly basis, copies of such records to the Tallahassee Office, Division of Law Enforcement. Such records shall be due no later than the last day of September, December, March, and June.

10. Private fox areas shall be designed, constructed and maintained so as to ensure that neither fox, coyotes, nor dogs can escape or enter the area. Fencing must provide a ground apron or electric wire capable of preventing animals from digging out and an overhang or electric wire capable of preventing animals from climbing over the fence.
11. Facilities and records of any private fox area are subject to inspection by representatives of the FWC at all times.
12. Failure to provide by all terms or conditions of this permit shall be grounds for revocation or denial of this permit under the provisions of Chapter 120, Florida Statutes.

This permit, **Number 2127-FX**, will expire **April 21, 2009**, unless otherwise authorized by the Executive Director.
